Bullying is when a person or group of people are being hurtful and unkind to another person or group,

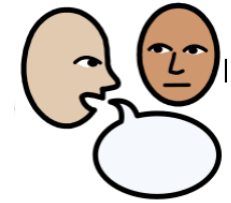
Several Times and On Purpose

Bullying Can Be

Physical - Punching, kicking, pulling hair and damaging people's property

Emotional - Nasty name calling, unkind comments, spreading untrue rumours, teasing and leaving people out

Cyber - Sending nasty messages and emails and being unkind on games

Bullying is not...

Falling out with friends - Sometimes we need a bit of time with different people

When something happens only once - This is isolated but can still be dealt with

Accidents - Because this wasn't done on purpose

Misunderstandings - Sometimes we don't fully understand what someone is saying to us and we need it explaining in a different way
